Description: Boston University supports two skating teams that are considered club sports. There are close to 50 skaters who belong to the BUFSC, and 35 of those are chosen to represent Boston University on the competitive figure skating team. The team (made up of freestyle skaters and ice dancers) competes in the Eastern Conference in the hopes of qualifying for the U.S. Intercollegiate Team Figure Skating Championships. Boston University is the 2009 and 2010 U.S. Intercollegiate champions. BU has a competitive synchronized skating team that also competes in the Eastern Conference and has qualified for the U.S. Synchronized Skating Championships for the past several years. The team is ranked ninth in the nation and is comprised of 20 skaters. BU has ice time available six days a week to support both teams. The figure skating team has a full-time coach, and the synchronized skating team has two coaches who work with the team twice a week. There are skaters who attend Boston University who are full-time students and are still actively competing at the regional, sectional and national levels. They supplement their training at the nearby Skating Club of Boston. There are several other opportunities for skaters who don't want to compete but stay involved with skating. BU has two exhibitions and a test session every year, and there are opportunities to coach at nearby facilities. The club is involved in several volunteer activities in the community to give back and to create team bonding.
